

Who We Are and Who We Serve...

- ♦ A 501(3)(c) private non-profit, the designated Care Management Organization (CMO) for Bergen County as part of the New Jersey Children's System of Care (CSOC). We provide comprehensive, individualized Wraparound service planning through a team process.
- The agency serves youth ages 5 to 21 with behavioral, emotional, and mental health challenges, substance use issues and developmental disabilities. Since 2002, we have served over 6,500 youth and their families. In 2017, the total number of youth served in 2017 was 1,819. Ninety-two percent of youth served in 2018 were living at home.


Outcomes

Examples with each area:

Risk Behaviors:

self injurious behavior, suicide risk, flight risk, fire setting, problematic sexual behavior, etc.

Life Domain Functioning: bullied by others, eating, sleep, sexual health, cultural stress; attachment, medical, etc.



Behavior/Emotional Needs:

anger control, psychosis, impulsivity and attention oppositional behavior, etc.

Medical Needs:

access to health care; family management of medical condition, impairment in functioning, pain, etc.

Trauma:


traumatic grief, witness to school/community violence, natural/man-made disasters, medical trauma, etc.

Substance Use:

acute intoxication/withdrawal, frequency/duration of use, risk behavior, peer influences, etc.

Legal Involvement:

environmental influences, parental criminal behavior, community safety, etc.



Out of Home:

community or site behavior; caregiver and youth interaction, caregiver participation, etc.

Outcomes—Behavioral Health Home (BHH)

During 2018, 118 families were enrolled in BHH services. These families received nursing care, and/or health education in addition to care coordination services. The Certified Health Education Specialists were in community providing health promotion and awareness education sessions throughout the year, including professional presentations at a conference for school counselors, and pediatric attendings and residents at St. Joseph's Hospital's Pediatric Grand Rounds. They also provided numerous presentations and workshops in daycares and schools around the county.

During 2018, two new team members joined BHH. These included a nurse and another Health and Wellness Educator.

We celebrate the positive impact this integrated approach provides for all eligible youth.






Community Partners in Education

Dumont School Collaboration

Pilot — Bergen's Promise and the Dumont School District are working together to maintain a successful relationship through quarterly collaboration meetings where shared youth are discussed, and training opportunities that will ensure that the following Educational Core values are maintained:

Communication: This is defined as the ability of Bergen's Promise staff to develop and maintain a professional and respectful dialogue with school personnel in order to share student information and to work jointly in the best interest of the students.




Collaborative Relationships: Productive collaborative relationships with school staff are built on successful and consistent *communication*.


Expectations: Ensure that the education expectations of the school district, parent/caregiver, and Bergen's Promise are in alignment with the child's education plan.


Knowledge: The effectiveness of a Care Manager is in direct proportion to the knowledge she/he has about the student's education history.

Empowerment of Youth/Family: Through effective Communication and Collaborative Relationships with school staff, as well as formidable Knowledge of the student's education status, the Care Manager is able to empower the family's confidence to represent the best interests of their child.

Community Partners in Integrated Healthcare



The Seton Hall Voices Program is a free program that allows families to get to know students who will be future doctors. Students will help families to reach health and wellness goals while families will teach them to be better doctors by sharing their life stories.

During visits, the family can:

- Learn how to be healthy
- Find out more about services that could help them
- Talk about medical visits (doctor, dentist, pharmacy)
- Go to medical visits, school meetings, or social service appointments with students
- Build a relationship with students who want to help

A newly established collaborative partnership with Hackensack Meridian-Seton Hall School of Medicine will provide an opportunity for our families in Hackensack and immediate vicinities to benefit from this natural community support as an extension of their Child



Bergen's Promise and North Hudson Community Action Federally Qualified Health Center entered a Business Agreement to exchange data on shared youth on a quarterly basis beginning in 2019, to foster a more holistic, collaborative approach to care of the families we serve.

We look to establish more of these partnerships with additional pediatric practices and hospitals in the future.








Collaborative Partnerships—Community Pediatrics and Child Advocacy Rotation




In 2018, the pediatric residents in their second year of training at St. Joseph's Hospital and Medical Center spend two weeks shadowing Care Managers of Bergen's Promise in family homes, school visits, treatment visits, and more. Over the past 2 years, 20 pediatric residents gained a clear understanding of the Wraparound Approach, the supports offered through each of the New Jersey Children's System of Care partners (Children's Mobile Response, Family Support Organization), an invaluable community resources in Bergen and Passaic counties. These experiences provide a different perspective of the social determinants of health that impact families in the St. Joseph's service area.

In their words—excerpt from pediatric resident narratives

What aspects of the rotation were most valuable?

Visiting institutions, schools and families in their homes, it helps to feel more involved and helps visualize exactly what they are going through. Also it's nice to see special education schools and departments involved with the child's services like DCPP, family support organization.

The opportunity to understand the family dynamics at home and how challenging it is for a family to take care of special children.

Learning the resources that are available to families allows me to make encourage my patients to reach out to receive these resources.

How will you apply what you've

learned through your immersion in the Children's System of Care?

I will be able to better explain to families what services are offered and I will definitely be referring more families in the outpatient and inpatient settings to call PerformCare.

I will consider social & economic conditions when evaluating mental development in children in order to assess it thoroughly.

I will help parents by teaching them how to search for resources and if they need more help we can connect them to PerformCare and we can also connect them to the Family Support Organization.

I am more knowledgeable now about the various programs in place to support my patient populations. I am also more aware of all the contributing social factors that affect children in this community. This will help me target my history taking and care.

Accomplishments...

In the Spring...

- Bergen's Promise started an initiative to train staff as Wraparound Coaches & Facilitators. As part of our strategic objective, it is our hope to move toward strengthening knowledge and utilization of the Wraparound Approach. With staff leaders accomplishing this certification, this ultimately helps to better serve our families and demonstrate leadership to their peers throughout the agency.
- During Mental Health Month, we shared submissions from teens for the "Connecting With Our Communities Service Project". The goal was for teens to raise awareness about an issue impacting teen mental/emotional health and a local resource available to support youth dealing with that issue. In 2019, Community Resources Director, Kathryn Werheim, will be presenting this project at the NJAHPERD 100th Annual Convention for K-12 Health/Physical Education teachers.



In the Summer...

We started a Family Ambassador Program for youth (17+) and/or caregivers benefiting from Bergen's Promise services. This volunteer opportunity includes website user experience, focus groups, family events, community outreach, and positive story videos. If interested in becoming an ambassador, email

Ann Klein Advocate Award— Our Executive Director, Dean Pastras received the 2018 Ann Klein Advocate Award. This award recognizes his commitment to quality services and supports for families of youth living with developmental disabilities and/or other vulnerable populations.



Director of Care Management, Crystal Wytenus, received an award from The Community Health Improvement Partnership of Bergen County (CHIP) recognizing her as a key community leader and co-chair of the Mental Health and Substance Abuse Task Force. She coordinated the 4th Annual Wellness Conference titled "Building Resiliency in Bergen: Empowering our Communities." As our liaison for substance treatment providers, Crystal has collaborated to provide quarterly education nights with local treatment providers; county Substance Use Navigators and collaboration on training series with New Bridge Medical Center Substance Use Navigators.

50 Community Education Events Attended by Bergen's Promise











Where We Get Our Money...And How We Spend It




Bergen's Promise Increases Number of Staff to Maintain Quality Service to Youth
